Dear Parents,

The new carparking arrangements and drop off seem to be working well and congestion appears to have eased.

Please could I take this opportunity of asking you to be extra vigilant when moving around the carpark area either on foot or in your vehicles. We will remind pupils at school about staying safe in the carpark area.



We have also just passed the autumn equinox and the nights and mornings will start to get darker so we will be reminding pupils of the need to have good road sense and to be seen. We would be grateful if you could reinforce this with your children at home.



Holy Cross Covid update – As we have all been instructed to learn to live with Covid I thought it might be of interest to you to know how the school is doing on the Covid front. Since we have returned back from the summer break we have had three members of staff who have tested positive and had to isolate, thankfully not all at the same time! All have now returned to school. We have had six confirmed cases amongst our pupils across Years 6, 5, 4 and 2. Three have since returned with three continuing to self isolate as per the guidance. We are very greatful for your support in helping us prevent the spread. If you think your child has Covid please keep them off and book a PCR test. We are also coming into the cold season which will make things even more interesting.

If your child has one of the main symptoms

- A high temperature (38+)
- A new continuous cough
- A loss of or change to your sense of smell or taste

Please keep them off and book a PCR test

This Friday, 24th September, is the Memorial of Our Lady of Walsingham. The story of Walsingham is enchanting, for it was in that tiny Norfolk village in the year 1061 that a noble lady called Richeldis had visions of the Blessed Virgin. In prayer, Our Lady showed her the Holy House of Nazareth, the home where Jesus, Mary and Joseph lived. She asked Lady Richeldis to build a replica of that house in the village, which she duly did, and so Walsingham soon became an international pilgrimage centre, after Rome and Jerusalem, one of the greatest in the medieval world. Thousands of pilgrims, from kings to the lowest, flocked there to pray to God, to honour Mary and to seek answers, often miraculous, to their prayers. Although destroyed at the Reformation by King Henry VIII, in 20C the shrine was revived and today flourishes as a place where both Anglicans and Catholics go to pray. Indeed, Walsingham is now England's national Marian shrine.

In the Middle Ages, more than any other land, England was known for its love of the Blessed Virgin: this is why it was called Mary's Dowry, and why so many churches were dedicated to St. Mary.

Our Catholic Schools need you!

Are you being called to serve as a foundation governor, helping our schools live out Bishop Philip's vision?

'Catholic parishes and Catholic schools exist to make Jesus Christ better known and better loved. The context for this mission in schools is always that they are places of educational excellence, where all can

grow in holiness as stewards of God's creation. A school's concern is to support families in the education of their children, especially their responsibility to help their children develop a personal relationship with God in Jesus Christ. The school therefore uses all the resources and expertise available for the harmonious physical, intellectual, moral and spiritual development of the young people in its care. In cooperation with the bishop, with parishes and with families, the school coordinates its activity to bring to full potential the gifts, talents and personalities of those young people for whom it is responsible.'

Across the diocese we have 412 foundation governors, serving on the governing bodies of 56 maintained schools and academies. We are very grateful to them for the support and challenge they provide for our schools and for the work they do to help bring about the Bishop's vision of 'Bringing people closer to Jesus Christ through His Church'.

With this large number of governors to recruit we are always looking for suitable parishioners to join them. We currently have 69 vacancies for foundation governors across 25 of our schools.

What is a foundation governor?

Foundation governors are volunteers who serve as the Bishop's representative to assist in leading our Catholic schools. They work alongside other governors to form a governing body who are responsible for the strategic direction of the school. They are involved in decisions about all aspects of the school – such as buildings and budgets, monitoring standards and the Catholic ethos. Foundation governors take a particular interest and responsibility for admissions to the school, the employment of staff, Religious Education, Relationship Education, the prayer life of the school and for ensuring that the Bishop's directives are implemented. Foundation governors have the further duty of assisting the Bishop in his role as first teacher and leader of the diocese. The governors help determine the future for pupils attending our schools.

'I've been a foundation governor for a number of years, the role is incredibly fulfilling, being able to support and safeguard the Catholic ethos of our school is so important to me, to know that future generations will benefit from the grounding, love and care of the Catholic education that both my children and I received is well worth the time and commitment needed. I would encourage anyone to consider serving on a governing body.'

Nominees would not be expected to have a direct knowledge of current education law, of school organisation or governance but should be willing to learn and dedicate reasonable time to their responsibilities.

Most governors will attend full governing board meetings (normally 3 or 4 a year) and additional committee meetings. There may also be tasks to be completed between meetings and opportunities to visit the school. It is important to recognise that for most new governors it can all be a bit baffling to begin with and all need support. Training and advice will be provided by the diocese, the local authority and most crucially by fellow governors. You are not on your own, governors work as a team supporting and challenging the school leadership.

'My Catholic faith is important to me and my family and when a vacancy arose at my local Catholic school, I applied to become a foundation governor. It was a surprise and a tremendous honour to be appointed as a Foundation Governor some 4 years ago. Over the years, I have found that you don't need a particular skill set or expertise in any subject matter or even a degree but you do need to be prepared to give your time, show commitment to the school and colleagues, a willingness to learn and take on new challenges, the ability to get along with people including stakeholders and a determination to see things through and not leave it to someone else to do. I have tried really hard to make a difference and when my time as a foundation governor is at an end, I would like to be able to say, I had a positive impact on the school and left it in a better place than when I joined.'

You do not need teaching experience and it is useful to bring skills from all areas of your life, such as financial, human resources, buildings, health and safety, safeguarding, parish work and community work. Schools are also looking for governors who reflect the ethnic, cultural and social background of their catchment area.

Foundation governors have an important part to play in ensuring the Catholic character of our schools and in building the community of Catholic schools throughout the diocese. Without them our schools are in jeopardy of losing their distinctiveness which will have a significant impact on the future lives of our children.

Governors are appointed for a 4-year term of office, after which they can be reappointed or pass the role on to someone else. Consequently, we are always seeking new foundation governors to serve in our schools. We currently have 69 vacancies across the diocese. Where can I find out more?

If you are interested in a particular school then as a first step check out the school's website and if still interested make contact with them to find out more about becoming a foundation governor there. Visit the CASO website (www.casoportsmouth.org.uk) and look through the pages dedicated to governors.

How can I apply?

If you want to apply to a particular school, firstly, make contact to check the school still has a current vacancy, and to see if they are looking for applicants with a particular skill set. The next step would then be to complete a foundation governor nomination form, this can be obtained direct from the school, or from the CASO website.

We are also very interested in applicants who are prepared to give service in a locality further afield than their own parish school. As above, the next step would be to complete a foundation governor nomination form.

We look forward to receiving your completed nomination form and working with you in the future.

Covid -19 School Guidance

We continue to follow the current public health advice and government guidance around reducing the risk of spreading Covid -19 in school.

- Children will still be encouraged to wash their hands/use hand sanitizer frequently
 - The "Catch it, bin it, kill it" message will continue to be reinforced.
 - Rooms will still be well ventilated
- Classrooms and equipment /resources will still be cleaned using the appropriate products
 - Children will no longer be in bubbles

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• For visitors to school, face coverings are no longer a requirement although it remains up to you if you wish to continue to wear one, especially in crowded places.

DfE guidance: What if someone tests positive or has symptoms? Self-isolate straight away and get a PCR test immediately if you have any of these symptoms:

a high temperature

a new, continuous cough,

• a loss of or change to your sense of smell or taste

You should also self-isolate if:

• you have tested positive for C-19 either according to a PCR test or a lateral flow device test. A positive Lateral flow device test (LFD) means you must book a PCR test. A negative PCR test will override a positive LFD test.

• someone you live with has symptoms or tested positive (unless you are not required to self-isolate – see below if this applies to you)

 you've been told to self-isolate following contact with someone who tested positive – find out what to do if you're told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace or the NHS COVID-19 app. (If you're told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace - NHS (www.nhs.uk)

Pupils should only self-isolate if they have symptoms or if they get a positive PCR or Lateral Flow Device (LFD) test. If they develop symptoms or get a positive LFD test, they should book a PCR test. A positive PCR test cannot be overridden. If a pupil is asked to get a PCR test as a result of contact with a positive case, they may continue to attend education until they get the result of their PCR back.

And what will happen for people who have been in contact with positive cases?

Individuals are not required to self-isolate if they live in the same household as someone with COVID-19, or are a close contact of someone with COVID-19, and any of the following apply:

• they are fully vaccinated

• they are below the age of 18 years and 6 months

• they have taken part in or are currently part of an approved COVID-19 vaccine trial

• they are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons. Instead, they will be contacted by NHS Test and Trace, informed they have been in close contact with a positive case and advised to take a PCR test. They do not need to isolate while awaiting the PCR test.

We would encourage all individuals to take a PCR test if advised to do so. Staff who do not need to isolate, and children and young people aged under 18 years 6 months who usually attend school, and have been identified as a close contact, should continue to attend school as normal. If none of the above applies, people should self-isolate as per the instructions from NHS Test and Trace (If you're told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace - NHS (www.nhs.uk))
